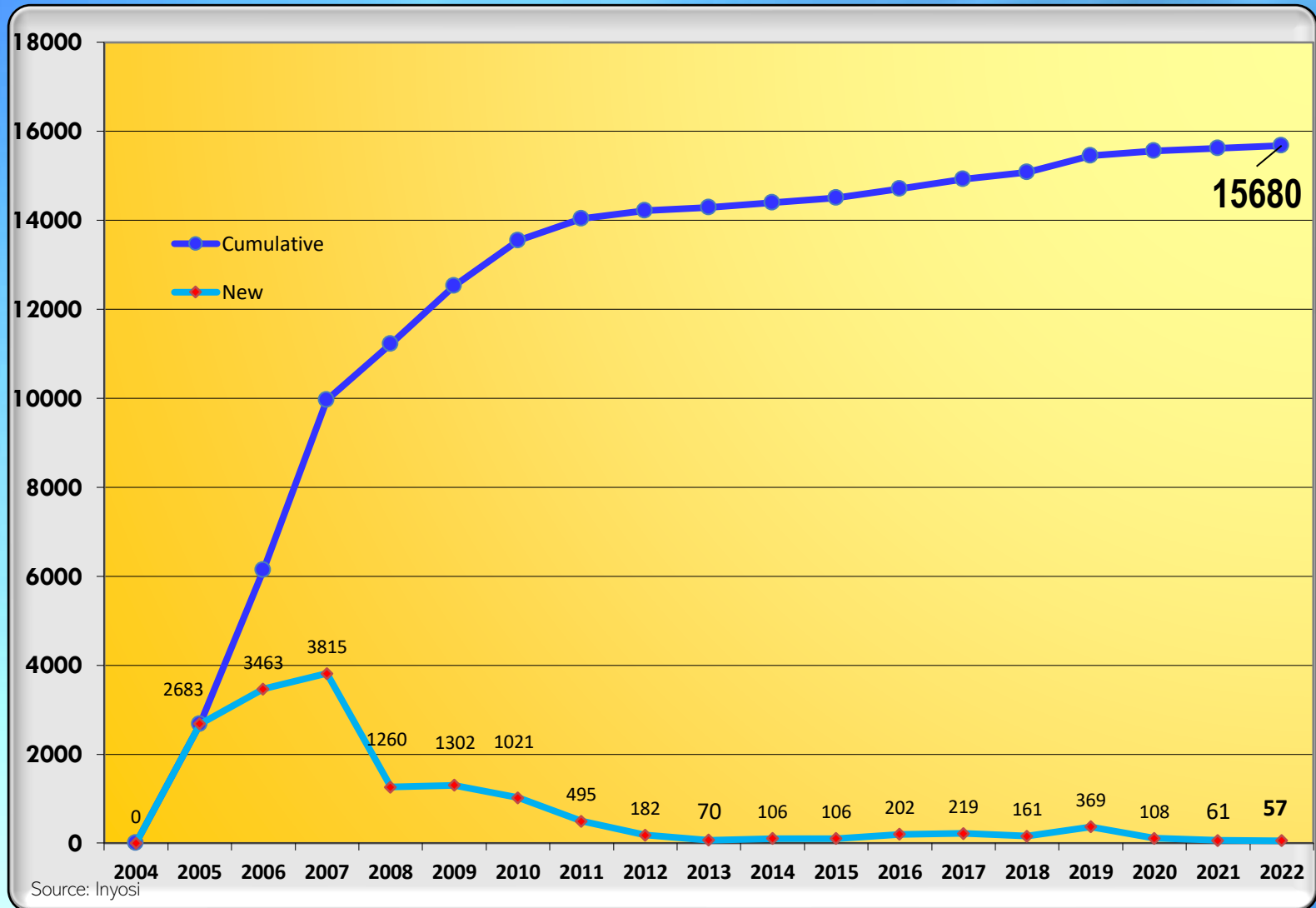

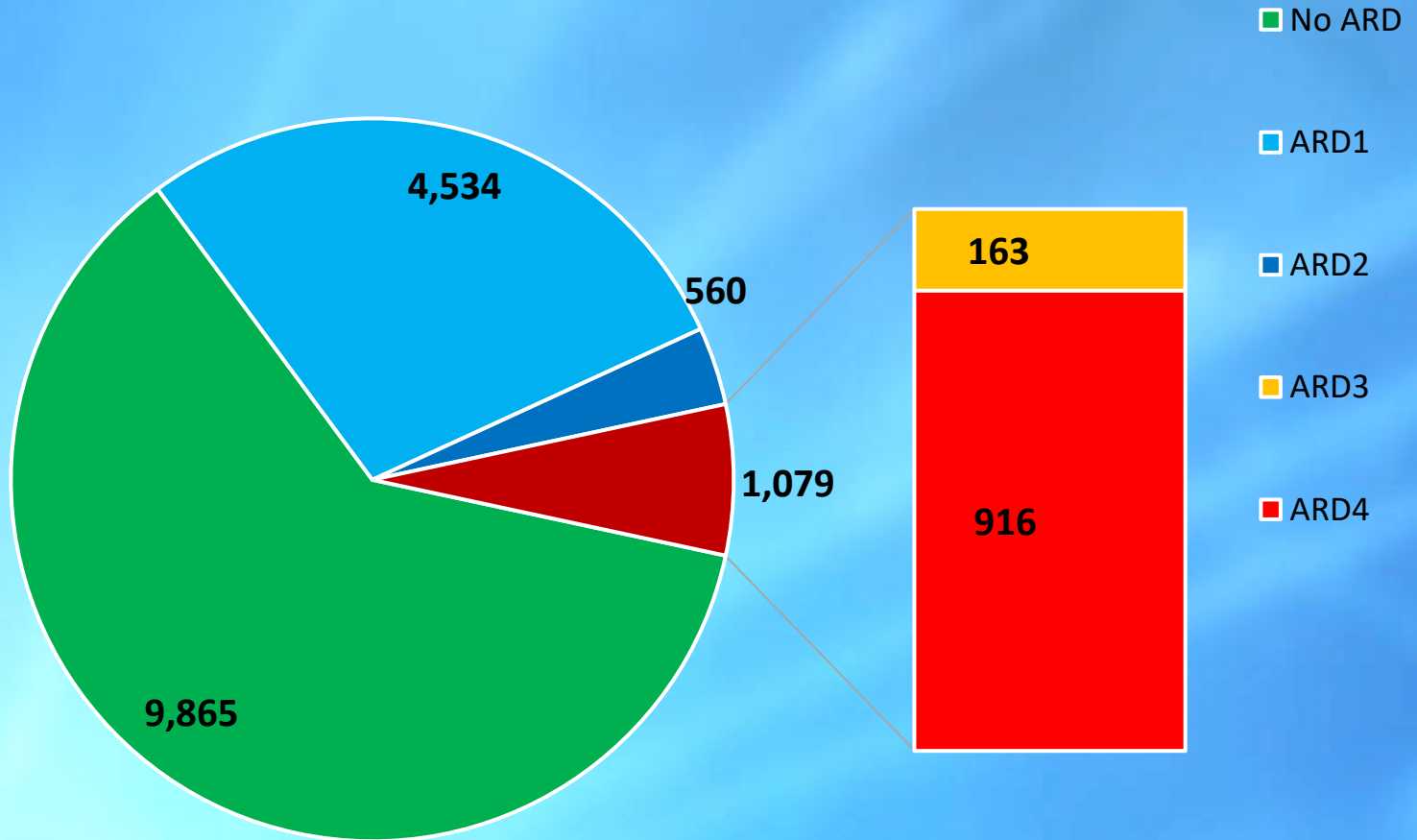
# New and cumulative medical files received by financial year end, 2005 - 2022



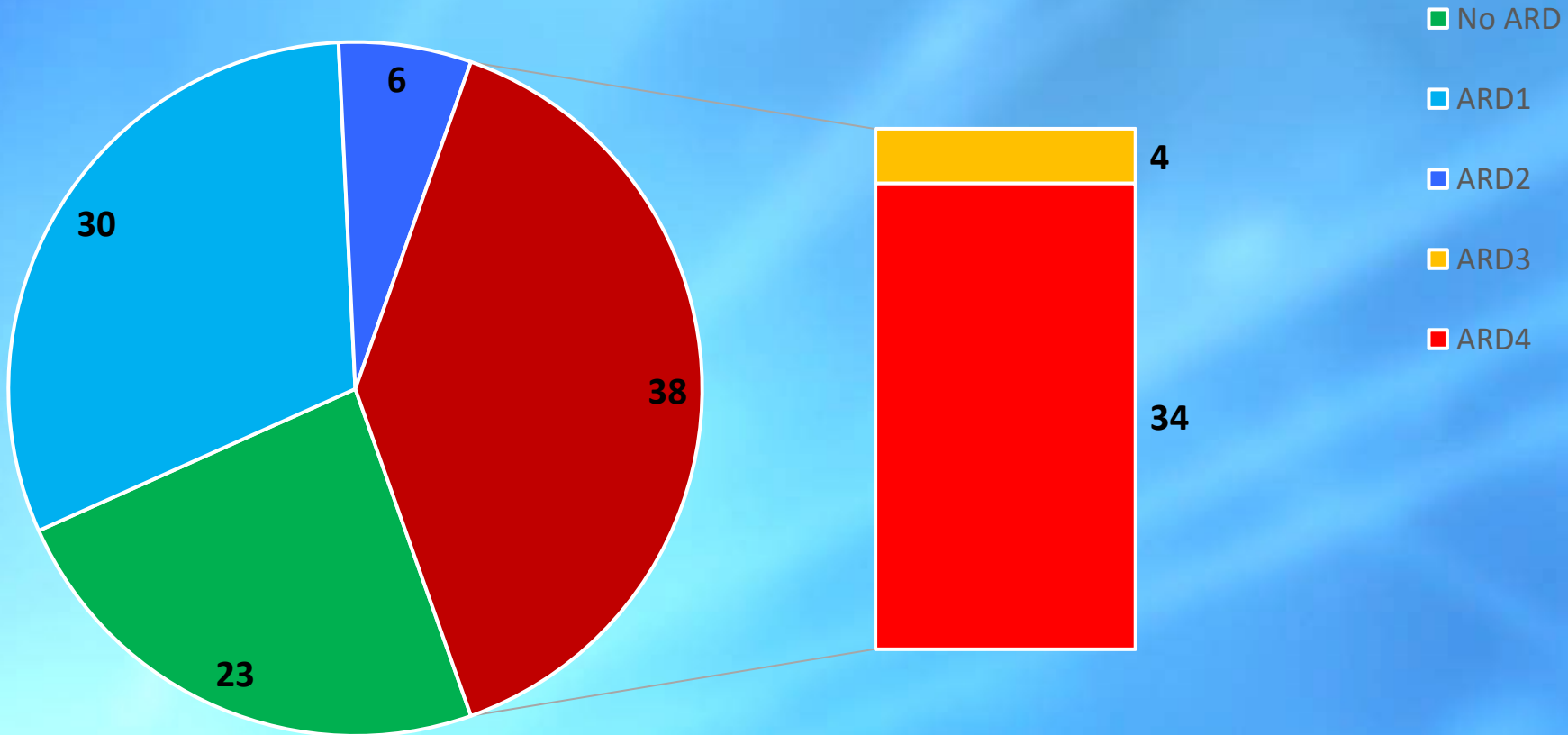

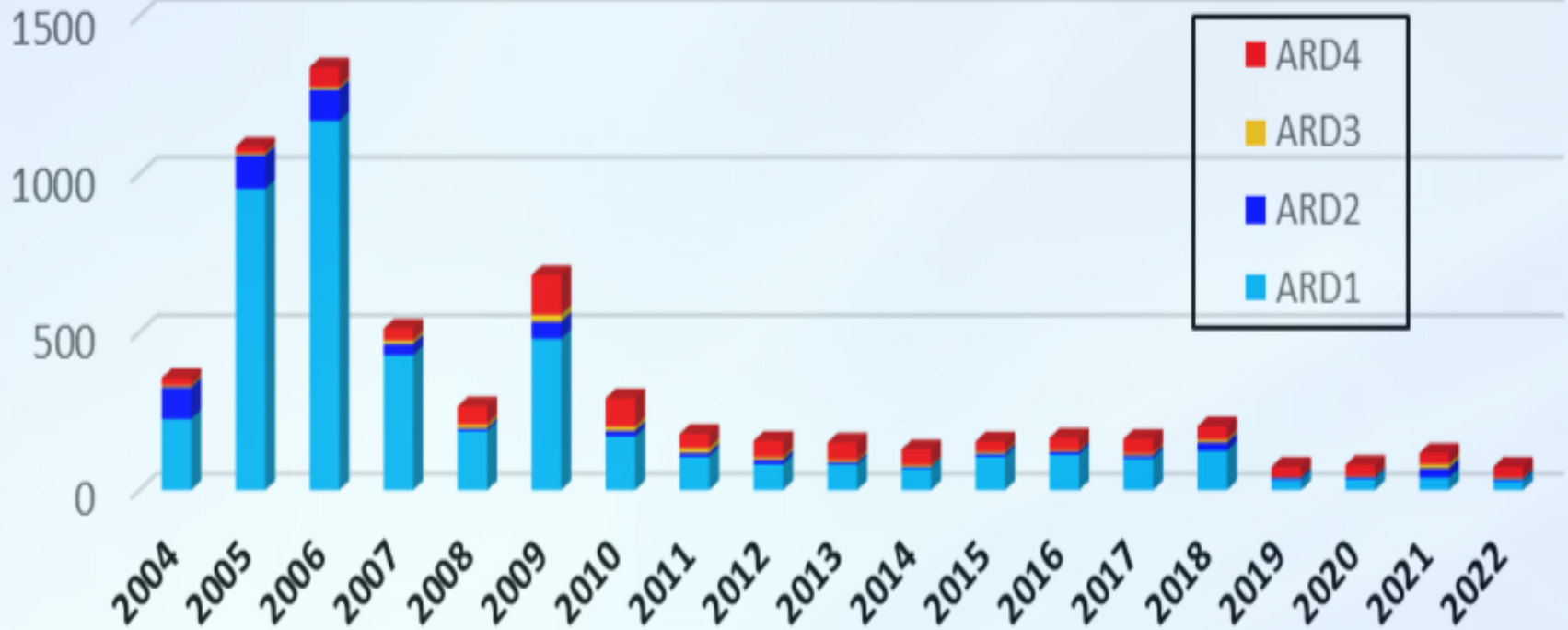
# Medical certifications 2005 - 2022



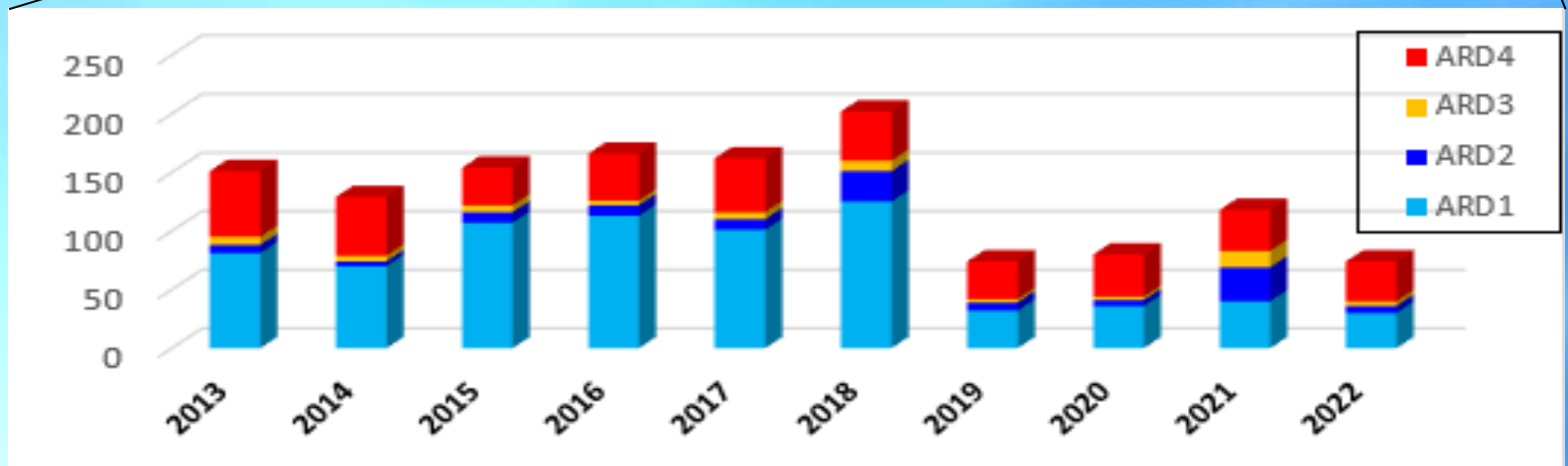
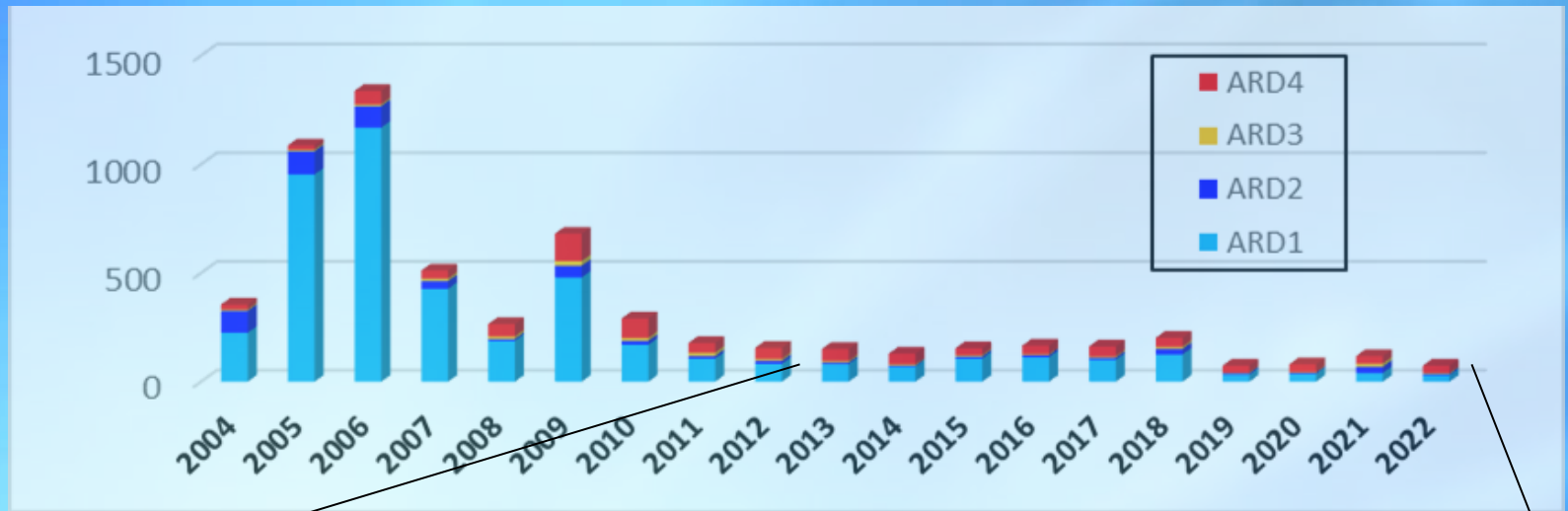
# Medical certifications - 2022 year



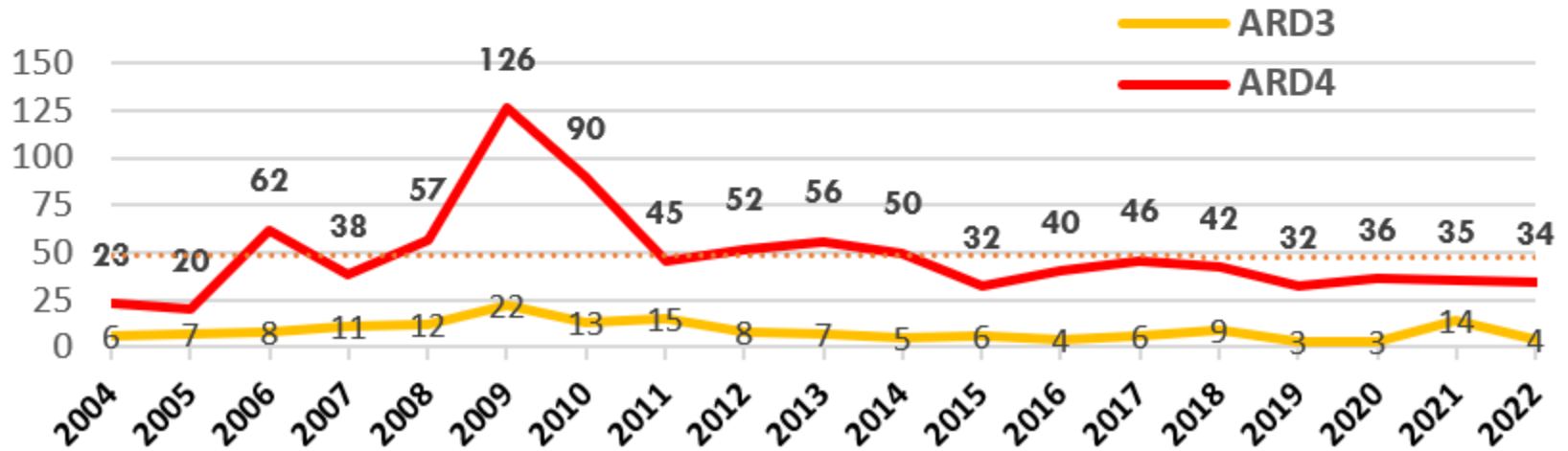
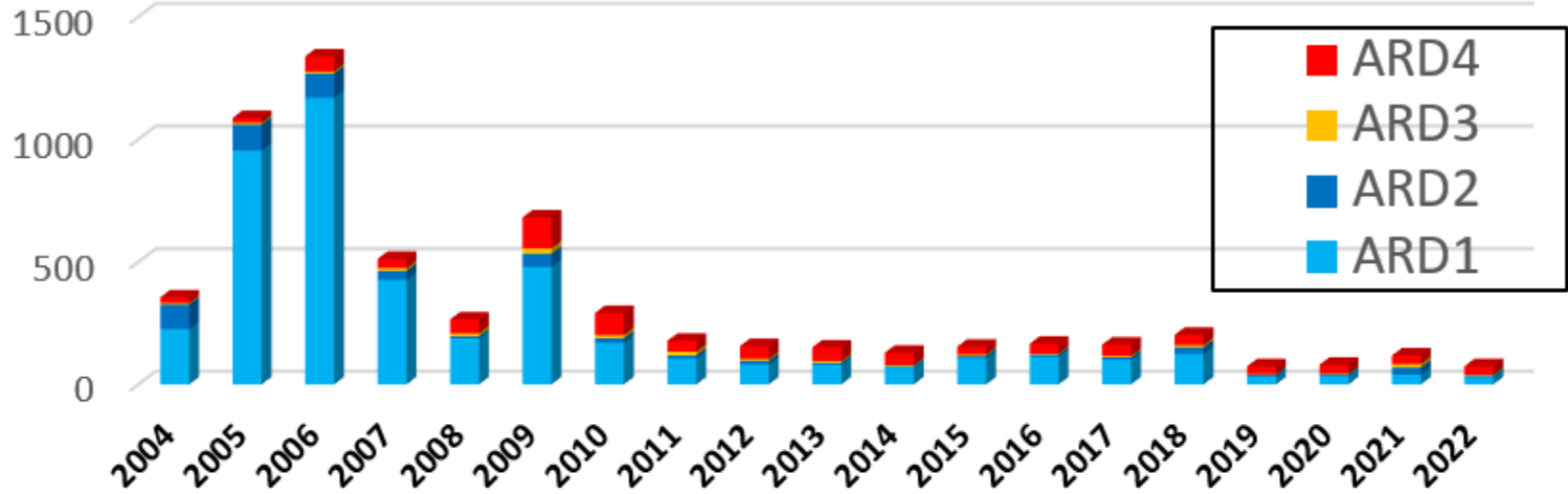
# Compensable certifications by *calendar year* showing both number and type

# PALLIATIVE CARE

- Cares for the quality of life of patients and their families who are facing life-threatening illness.
- Prevents and relieves suffering through the early identification, correct assessment and treatment of pain and other problems, whether physical, psychosocial or spiritual.

Caring for suffering treats issues beyond physical symptoms.

Palliative care uses a team to support patients and their caregivers, addressing practical needs and providing bereavement counselling.

Supports and helps patients live as actively as possible until death.





**Pain and difficulty in breathing** are two of the most common and serious symptoms of patients in need of palliative care.

**Opioids** are essential for managing pain and can alleviate other common distressing physical symptoms including breathlessness.

Controlling such symptoms at an early stage is an ethical duty to relieve suffering and to respect a person's dignity.

Early delivery of palliative care reduces unnecessary hospital admissions and the use of health services.

Palliative care uses services of a range of professionals that all have key roles —

doctors, nurses, support workers, paramedics, pharmacists,  
physiotherapists and volunteers —

in support of the patient and their family.



Palliative care is explicitly recognized under the human right to health.

It is provided through person-centered and integrated health services that pay special attention to the specific needs and preferences of individuals.

Palliative care is holistic caring.

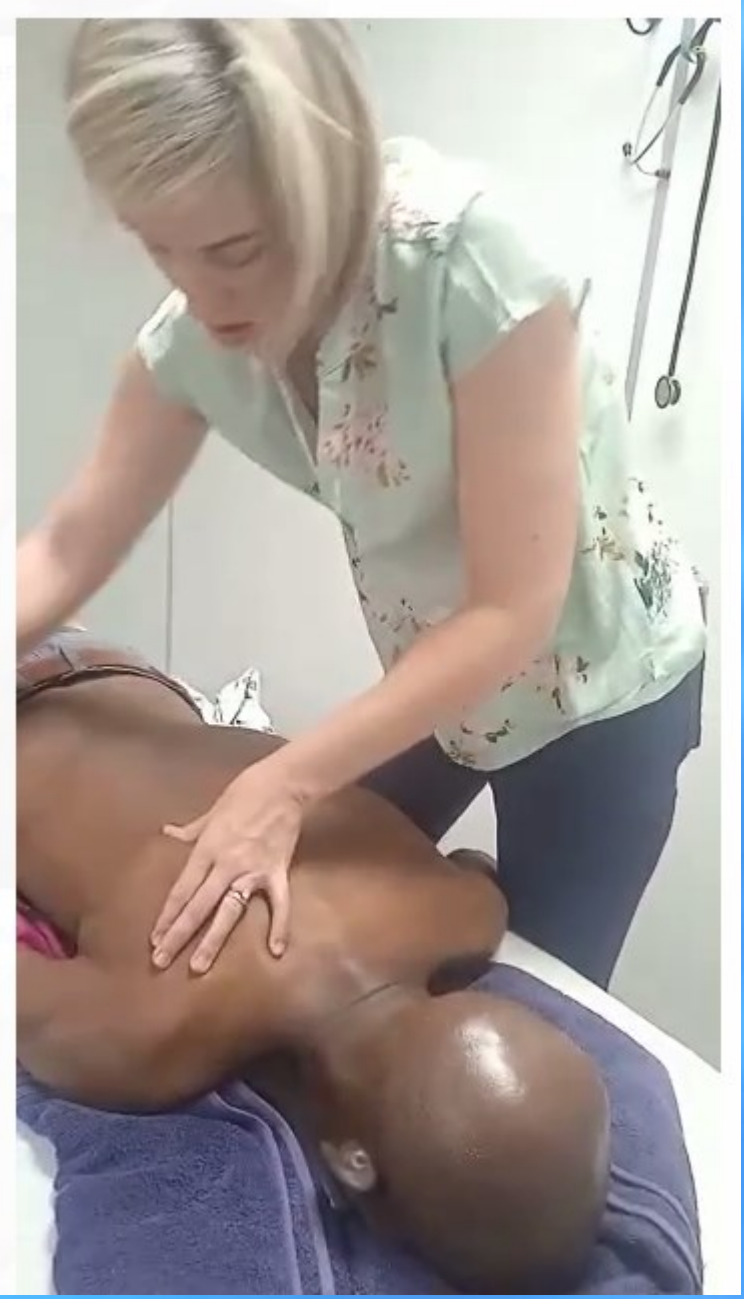
